



RTTA Trail Use Policy

- Only RTTA members who have completed the membership application confirming adherence to this policy, signed the liability waiver and paid the required fee may access the RTTA trails.
- Stay alert for and be respectful of other people and horses on the trail. Try to be sure they are aware of your presence and be patient and cautious especially if and when passing.
- Helmets are highly recommended for everyone, especially for those under the age of 18.
- Motorized vehicles are not permitted on the trails except for maintenance on Wednesdays or for emergencies and only by RTTA Full members. Bicycles are also prohibited on the trails.
- Horse drawn carriages are allowed on Wednesdays only and only on specifically identified portions of the trail system designated for this purpose. All members should be aware of the potential presence of carriages in those areas and all 'riders' must be aware of potential ongoing maintenance activities on Wednesdays as well.
- If dogs are brought on the RTTA trails they must be leashed at all times and electronic training or hunting collars are not sufficient for this purpose. Any damage or injury to other people or animals is the responsibility of the dog owner and the owner is liable for all costs.
- Stay off any trails not identified as RTTA trails – see signs and/or RTTA trail map. These are on private property and for use only by the property owners.
- Please do not perform any maintenance on the trails, including tree trimming, without permission of the trail committee. Issues or hazards which need to be addressed should be reported to the RTTA trail maintenance committee through RTTATrails@hotmail.com . Management of the campground may also be informed if you are staying there.
- If nature calls while you are on the trails, please bring a bag to clean up and dispose of all waste including tissue/toilet paper.
- If you pack it in, pack it out. No littering of any kind including food wrappers, liquid containers and other refuse. The trails are monitored with security cameras and if you are caught disposing garbage on the trails your membership could be revoked.
- Understand the state of TN requires a current valid negative Coggins [Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA)] test and that evidence should be available for any and all equine on the RTTA trails.
